

Importance of Senior Year

- Courses Matter!
 - Preparation for college-level work
 - Strength of schedule
- Grades Matter!
 - Cumulative GPA, HOPE GPA, and Class Rank
 - Matriculation at college requires successful completion of senior course work

- <u>College Rep Visits to CHS</u>
 - Students must see the Counseling Administrative Assistant at least one day prior to the visitation to get a pass (teacher must give permission to student)
 - Visitation schedule will be posted in Counseling Office and on Counseling web site
 - Email blasts from Counseling Office
 - August/September Visits





- <u>College Visits / College Visit Checklist</u>
 - Seniors may take up to three college visitation days during the school year
 - Requests must be submitted in writing from a parent/guardian to the Counseling Office <u>at least</u> <u>three school days</u> prior to the absence
 - Assignments due during the absence must be submitted prior to the absence
 - Check with college for visitation dates/times

- Check <u>high school course requirements</u> for admission carefully
- Check college websites for information about <u>GPA computation and use of</u> <u>SAT/ACT scores</u>
- When in doubt, call/email admissions
- Students should take the lead in the process and complete all parts of the application themselves

 - Thursday, November 15, in CHS Computer Labs
 - All Seniors are given the opportunity to apply to a College of their choice during the school day
 - Assistance will be provided by Counselors, College Admissions Representatives, and Community Members

Completing The Application

- Read application directions carefully and thoroughly, then re-read...
- Follow directions—send colleges exactly what they specify (no more, no less)
- Apply online and use Common Application (www.commonapp.org) and/or GA College 411 (www.gacollege411.org) when possible

Completing The Application

- The order in which colleges receive parts of the application does not matter as long as all parts are received by the stated deadline
- An application is considered complete (and ready for review) once all required parts have been received by the college





- Components of the Application
 - <u>Student/Parent Information and Educational</u>
 <u>History</u>
 - Academic Self-Report
 - Extracurricular Activities and Honors
 - Depth, not necessarily breadth
 - Leadership, commitment, uniqueness
 - Essay(s)/Short Response Questions
 - Articulate demonstrated interest
 - Unifying theme, showcase individuality





- Components of the Application (cont'd)
 Official High School Transcript: Must be requested from Counseling Office
 - Official SAT/ACT Score Reports: Must be requested directly from the testing service
 - SAT Subject Tests (some colleges)
 - Teacher Recommendation(s)
 - School/Counselor Recommendation
 - Signature and Fee
 - Other

A \$2 late fee will apply if deadline is less than 10 school days from date of request





- Steps for Processing of Requests
 - Student obtains his/her blue transcript card (name label on card) from transcript request file in Counseling Office
 - 2. Student fully completes one line per transcript request
 - 3. Student attaches payment for required fees (if applicable)
 - 4. Student attaches counselor/school recommendation forms (if applicable)
 - 5. Student submits card and any applicable attachments to Ms. White for processing

CHS Counseling Dep



- Once processed and verified by Counselor, transcripts (and required recommendations) will be mailed or submitted electronically
- Blue Transcript Card will be returned to Transcript Request File for additional student requests
- Request must be submitted at least <u>10</u>
 <u>school days</u> prior to a deadline
- \$2 late fee will apply if deadline is less than 10 school days from date of request



- Transcripts may be submitted electronically to:
 - 1. GA Colleges and Universities
 - 2. Members of Common Application
 - 3. NCAA Clearinghouse
- There is no charge for electronic transcripts
- Students are responsible for following up with the college to ensure that the electronic transmission was received





Transcript Requests

- Paper transcripts are mailed to all out-ofstate Colleges / Universities (unless member of Common Application)
- Cost for paper transcripts is \$3 cash per transcript sent
- Students are responsible for following up with the college to ensure that the transcript was received





- Paper transcripts require a 9 x 12 envelope addressed to the college and at least three first-class stamps
 - Student may provide addressed envelope and stamps
 - Student may pay an additional \$2 cash to purchase the envelope and postage from the Counseling Office (address of college must be provided)





- Electronic Transcripts: Free
- Paper Transcripts: \$3 each
- Envelope/Postage: \$2 each
- Late Fee (requests submitted less than 10 days in advance of the deadline): \$2 each





Transcript Requests

• GA College 411?

- Students have the capability to request transcripts for GA colleges and universities using their GA College 411 student account
- <u>http://portal.fultonschools.org/Students/Docu</u> <u>ments/electronic_transcript_instructions.pdf</u>
- CHS will accept requests via GA College 411; however, the requests will <u>not</u> be filled *until the student makes the same requests* on his/her Transcript Card





- Counselors will submit recommendations upon student request when *required* by a college/university
- Student must indicate on Transcript Card that a recommendation is required
- If required, submit the request to the Counselor electronically via Common Application or College Website (if available) or print a hard copy and attach it to the Transcript Card with request

CHS Counseling Dep



- Allow at least <u>10 school days</u> for a recommendation request to be completed
- Completed <u>Student and Parent</u> <u>College/Scholarship Recommendation</u> <u>Questionnaires</u> are *required* before recommendations will be processed (Recommended deadline for receipt = *September 30*)





- Follow directions in the application exactly in terms of number of recommendations, from whom, etc.
- Choose teachers who know student well—preferably from junior/senior years
- Give teachers a resume or the completed senior questionnaire
- Allow at least 10 school days for recommendation to be completed

Net Price Calculator

- Cost of Attendance
 Direct Costs
 - Tuition and Fees
 - Room and Board
 - Indirect Costs
 - Books and Supplies
 - Transportation
 - Personal Expenses

<u>Net Price</u> = Cost of Attendance minus total need and merit-based grant aid





Net Price Calculator

- Dollar amounts generated are <u>estimated</u> amounts
- All colleges and universities must now make net price calculators available on their web sites
- <u>http://netpricecalculator.collegeboard.org/</u>





Applying for Financial Aid

- To apply for federal student aid, you must fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov or www.studentaid.ed.gov
- Apply on or after **January 1, 2013** but as early as possible to meet all deadlines
- Students and parents will need to apply for a PIN at <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u>





Applying for Financial Aid

- FAFSA is required by many colleges to receive different forms of institutional assistance, and it can also serve as the HOPE/Zell Miller Scholarship application at GA Public Colleges and Universities
- CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE used by some colleges to determine eligibility for non-federal aid programs
- CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE available on October 1 via <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>

Requirement:

 3.0 GPA as calculated by the Georgia Student Finance Commission

The following scale is used to convert numeric grades to a 4.0 GPA scale:

- 4.0 = 90 or greater
- 3.0 = 80 89
- 2.0 = 70 79
- 0.0 = 69 or less

- Only academic courses in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and World Language included
- All middle school grades removed
- All honors points removed
- All AP courses awarded an extra 0.5 quality points after GPA conversion (up to a maximum 4.0; A's are not weighted)
- The final HOPE GPA will NOT be rounded up

 - Click on the "Your HOPE GPA" shortcut on the right-hand side of the home page
 - Sign in using username and password
 - Follow on-screen directions





- Applying for HOPE
 - GA Public Colleges and Universities: FAFSA or GSFAPPS
 - GA Private Colleges and Universities: GSFAPPS
 - Available through <u>www.gacollege411.org</u>
 - Individual colleges/universities may have required institutional forms





GA Public Institutions

- Pays a percentage amount of standard tuition charges from previous year (will change yearly)—posted on GA College 411
 No book or fee allowances
- GA Private Institutions
 - Pays a <u>percentage amount</u> of the HOPE award (this year's maximum is \$3600 total)
 - Tuition Equalization Grant (\$700 this year)
 - No book or fee allowances





 No payment for remedial or developmental courses

 If a student falls below a 3.0 GPA in college, he/she may regain the scholarship only <u>one</u> time





Zell Miller Scholarship

Requirements

1.Meet all HOPE eligibility requirements

2.3.7 or greater HOPE GPA

3.1200+ CR/M score on a single SAT administration or an ACT composite score of 26+

Zell Miller Scholarship

Payment Guidelines

1.GA Public Colleges and Universities: Full tuition paid

2.GA Private Colleges and Universities: \$4,000 per year for current year

Zell Miller Scholarship

- No payment for remedial or developmental courses
- If a student falls below a 3.3 GPA in college, s/he may regain the scholarship only <u>one</u> time





HOPE Grant

- Available to students seeking a certificate or diploma at a TCSG or USG institution
- No GPA requirement upon entrance to program, but a 3.0 GPA on eligible coursework must be maintained in college
- Students who fall below a 3.0 GPA while in college may regain the grant <u>one</u> time





HOPE Grant

 Pays a percentage amount of standard tuition charges and is subject to change yearly

NCAA Eligibility Center

- NCAA Clearinghouse new site: Apply now via <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u>
- Division I and II Eligibility for Athletics and Athletic Scholarships
 - 16 Core Courses required
 - Minimum GPA required
 - Minimum SAT required
- Division III Not "certified" by Eligibility Center
