Centennial 101



Carnegie Units

- I Semester Class = .5 credit
- I Yearlong Class = I credit (.5 earned per semester)

Grading Scale

A (90-100)

B (80-89)

C (70-79)

F (<70)

 7 additional points are added to a final grade of 70 or above in approved Honors and Advanced Placement (AP) courses

Centennial IOI: Grading



In middle school, grades are calculated using <u>a</u> system of averages.

• Example

8th grade English

Semester I: 60 (F)

Semester 2: 80 (B)

*Yearly Ave: 70 (C)

• Student passes class for the year (earns I full credit)

In Fulton County, high school grades <u>are not</u> <u>averaged</u>... Each semester is independent.

• Example

9th grade English

Semester I: 60 (F)

Semester 2: 80 (B)

*No Yearly Average

• Student fails 1st semester; passes 2nd semester (earns ½ credit)

End of Course Tests



EOCT courses:

- Biology*
- Physical Science
- 9th Lit/Comp*
- IIth Lit/Comp
- CCGPS Coord.Algebra*
- CCGPS Geometry
- US History
- Economics

- The EOCT is weighted at 20% of a student's final course grade (S2)
- Most teachers will weight the SI final the same as the EOCT
- 9th grade courses are marked with an *
- Final exams are given in all other courses – see teacher syllabi for details

GPA Calculation



- To calculate FCS GPA:
- By Semester
 - Add final course grades for semester
 - Divide by total courses taken
- Cumulative GPA
 - Add final grades for each course
 - Divide by total courses taken
- Courses are not weighted by credit earned (a 1.0 credit course counts the same as a 0.5 credit course when calculating GPA)
- HOPE GPA
 - Determined annually by the GA Student Finance Commission

Centennial 101



High School credits earned in Middle School

- Students can have earned HS credits for math and/or world languages.
- 7th and 8th grade world language equals 1.0 HS credit.
- Student/Parent must provide an official transcript from the school awarding the course credit(s).

Promotion

- Freshmen: 0 4.5 credits
- Sophomores: 5.0 10.5 credits
- Juniors: 11.0 16.5 credits
- Seniors: 17.0 or more credits

Progress Reports and Report Cards

- Progress Reports provide student's status at the 6 and 12 week marks
- Report Cards provide the student's final grades for the semester
- Home Access Center (HAC)

The counselor can be contacted for support in scheduling meetings with all teachers or general academic support

Administrators are available for academic support after contact has been initiated with the teacher

Graduation Requirements

23 credits required

- English 4 credits
- Math 4 credits
- **Science** 4 credits
- Social Studies 3 credits
- CTAE/World Language/Fine Arts* 3 credits
 - *Note: 2 or 3 years of World Language credits may be required for college admission
- Health/Personal Fitness I credit (each .5)
- **Electives** 4 credits


- 9th Grade Lit & Comp

*Required Summer Reading for all Honors and AP level Lang Arts courses.



MATHEMATICS (4 CREDITS)

- CCGPS Algebra or CCGPS Accelerated Algebra
- CCGPS Geometry or CCGPS Accelerated Geometry
- CCGPS Advanced Algebra or Accelerated Pre-Calculus
- 4th CCGPS Approved Math Course (Centennial counselor will assist with student their options)



Support Math Classes**

Math courses designed to provide students extra support in math, but can only be counted as elective credit

SCIENCE (4 CREDITS)



- Biology

- Approved 4th Science Course

Course Selection and Changes

Teachers will recommend students for academic placement during the spring semester

Parents/students will be given the opportunity to review recommended placements; questions should be directed to the teacher and/or counselor <u>prior</u> to enrollment in the course

Students will be given opportunities to select elective courses; changes may be made within the designated enrollment period (Feb – May)

After the verification period, students are expected to complete courses in which they enroll

Changes after the verification period will be rare and will require administrative approval


