New academic requirements are included in the HOPE legislation. These changes will impact students graduating from high school on or after May 1, 2015. In order to qualify for the HOPE Scholarship, students must meet the following academic requirements.

#### **College Application Tips**

- · Read all requirements thoroughly
- Complete the application in full and provide supporting material only if requested (transcript, recommendation, etc.)
- Follow directions
- Neatness counts
- Write an essay (if required) that makes a strong impression be personal and specific
- Meet all deadlines
- Put your name on all pages
- Keep a back-up copy in case anything goes wrong
- · Proofread the entire application carefully
- Ask for help if you need it. If you have a question, contact the college's admissions office.

#### **Scholarships**

Scholarships are financial aid that help a student pay for college and do not have to be repaid. Scholarships are generally reserved for students with special qualifications such as academic, athletic or artistic talent. Awards may also be available for students interested in particular fields of study, who are members of underrepresented groups, who live in certain areas of the country, or who demonstrate financial need. Some private scholarship sponsors occasionally establish scholarships with esoteric eligibility requirements—such as a scholarship for left-handed students. While these are rare, they attract a lot of attention because they are so unusual.



Where do you find these scholarships?

- Free online, personalized scholarship search services that compare your qualifications with a database of awards (see list on back)
- Contact the colleges you are applying to and ask about university-based scholarship opportunities and procedures
- Visit the CHS Scholarship Database regularly for updated local, regional and national scholarship opportunities
- Complete the FAFSA after January 1 of your senior year to apply for federal and state aid programs, including HOPE

#### FAQs: Transcripts, Letters of Rec and More

#### How does a student request a transcript?

- Pick up Transcript Order Instructions from the Counseling Office
- Follow the instructions for ordering your transcript—allow 10 school days for processing
- Track the delivery of your transcript through your college account. Once sent, verify it has been received by the recipient
- Make sure your parent or guardian has completed the "Consent for Release of Official Documents" survey.

#### What if I need a counselor recommendation?

- All college recommendations are to be submitted electronically through either the Common Application, Send Edu, or the college's preferred online portal.
   Enter your counselor's name and email address (verify you entered the correct address)
- Recommendation Forms for scholarships or other institutions which are not available electronically should be printed out. The student should complete/sign the necessary sections as indicated.
- Go to the College Planning tab on <a href="https://www.mycentennialcounseling.com">www.mycentennialcounseling.com</a> and complete both the Student and Parent portions of the CHS Senior Profile. Save and email to your counselor or print out a copy to attach to your recommendation request card you will submit.
- Fill out a Counselor Recommendation Request card in the Counseling office.
   Indicate on the card your deadline and which electronic recommendation portal the counselor should receive your online request from.
- · Give your counselor at least 10 school days complete recommendations.

Requests for counselor recommendations and transcripts for applications with a deadline which falls between December 15<sup>th</sup> and January 5<sup>th</sup> must be submitted by Dec 9th to ensure on time delivery.

#### How do I request a teacher recommendation?

- Ask your selected teacher(s) in advance if they will write a recommendation on your behalf
- · Provide them with a copy of your Senior Profile and/or resume
- All college recommendations are to be submitted electronically through either the Common Application, Send Edu, or the college's preferred online portal.
   Enter your teacher's name and email address (verify you entered the correct address)
- Allow your teacher plenty of time to complete your recommendation at least 10 school days

#### How do I have my SAT or ACT scores reported to colleges?

- Specify colleges to which scores should be reported when registering for the test
- If you have already taken the test and have not had your scores reported, contact the testing service to request that score reports be sent to the college(s) of your choice (incurs fees for service)

#### The GPA Mystery Unlocked

Numeric Grade Average (NGA): The final semester grade for every attempted HS course is averaged together on a 100 point scale. NGA includes honors points. Fulton County School System uses an NGA for reporting to colleges (ex. 87.4412)

4.0 Cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA)\*: Every semester grade on the transcript is converted from numerical to a 4.0 scale and then averaged together. A = 4, B = 3, C = 2, Failing = 0 (ex. 2.254)

\*Fulton County does not convert NGAs to GPAs for college applications. Colleges are accustomed to seeing the numerical average on a 100 point scale. Many colleges will convert student records to their own scale.

Core GPA: Same as 4.0 GPA above, but it only includes grades for English, Math, Science, Social Studies and World Language classes. "7" points may or may not remain in the grade depending on the college/program.

**HOPE GPA:** Same as Core GPA shown above. All AP, honors, and college courses are stripped of their 7 points and converted to the 4.0 scale

- Honors and College courses then simply convert
   Ex. 92 7 = 85 and 85 = 3.0
- An AP grade is stripped, converted and then receives .5 to the grade
   Ex. 92 in an AP class becomes 85 and converted to a 3.5 for HOPE; maximum 4.0
- Overall GPA must be 3.0 for HOPE or 3.7 for Zell Miller
- HOPE does not count middle school grades

Please note that personal calculations can give students an **idea** of where they stand, but are <u>only estimates</u>. The only official calculation comes from the **Georgia Student Finance Commission**.

#### Responsibilities in the College Application Process

#### Students are responsible for:

- Completing applications
- · Meeting deadlines
- Submitting requests for teacher/counselor recommendations in a timely manner (at least 10 days prior to due date)
- Sending required standardized test scores (SAT/ACT)
- Following the admissions policies and procedures of each college or university Remember all college applications are not the same. Specific questions concerning admission requirements or procedures should be addressed to the undergraduate admissions office of that college.
- Submitting applications, requesting official transcripts, counselor recommendations, etc.

#### Parents are responsible for:

Allowing students to "own" the process

#### Colleges and Universities are responsible for:

- · Providing students with infor mation
- Allowing you until May 1 to respond to an offer of admission and/or financial aid, except for early decision candida tes

#### CHS Counseling Office is responsible for:

- Providing students and par ents with information and counsel which will enable them to make educated decisions regarding college choices and progressing through the admissions proc ess
- Processing secondary school report for ms, transcripts, and counselor recommendations in a timely manner to ensure the meeting of deadlines

#### Types of Admission Decisions

Early Admission: An exceptional student would terminate his/her high school education after the junior year without earning a high school diploma and enroll in college

Early Decision: Allows a student to apply prior to an early deadline for an early determination of admissibility. IT IS NORMALLY BINDING!

Early Action: Invites early applications but does not require the student to attend if accepted. Typically Non-Binding!

<u>Deferred Decision</u>: Is the determination of the college or university that more information is needed to make a final decision about a candidate's application

Rolling Admissions: The applicant is notified as soon as the application has been processed and the file is complete

<u>Open Admissions</u>: Students notified of acceptance upon application (usually community colleges)

<u>Deferred Admission</u>: Permits a student, once accepted, to postpone matriculation for one year

Conditional Admission: Admitted provided that you continue to meet the requirements of the school or complete additional coursework/supplemental program



## Need to request an official transcript or counselor recommendation? Here's how...

#### #1: Know your deadline!

It takes time for a transcript/recommendation request to be processed. All requests must be submitted at least 10 school days prior to your deadline.

Make sure your parent/guardian completes the "Consent for Release of Official Documents" survey. You can scan the QR code below or go to https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/SBRHVPQ.



#### Complete your transcript/recommendation request in the Counseling Office

Pull your card from the "Transcript Request" box on Ms. White's desk. Complete the form by filling out one line for each transcript/ recommendation you are requesting. For example, if you need 3 transcripts, you will fill out 3 lines on the card. Centennial will only process transcript requests submitted via a completed transcript/recommendation card request. We will not process any online transcript or recommendation requests until we have received a completed transcript card request corresponding to the online request.

#### Counselor recommendation required?

Check the college or scholarship website carefully to see if a counselor recommendation is required as part of your application. If a recommendation is required, follow these steps...

- Step 1: Student and parent/guardian complete a "Senior Profile" and turn it in to your counselor. Electronic versions are available on the counseling website on the 'Just for Seniors' page. Hard copies can also be picked up in the Counseling Office.
- Step 2: Locate the counselor recommendation form:
  - If recommendation is sent electronically, enter your counselor's name and email address into your online application to allow your counselor to
    access your online recommendation portal. Make sure you enter the email address accurately!
  - If the recommendation is only available in hard copy or PDF form, print it out and turn in with your request card.
- Step 3: Indicate on your transcript card that a recommendation is required and indicate if it will be sent electronically or hard copy (if hard copy, attach the form to the card).

#### **Transcript Delivery Options:**

- Georgia Colleges/Universities and NCAA (Electronic): Your application to the college should be submitted before requesting a transcript/recommendation.
- O Schools on the Common Application (Electronic) Only available for schools on the Common App. Requires you to enter your counselor's name and email address as your requested recommender for your Secondary School Report. You must fill out and submit your Common App before submitting a transcript/recommendation request. If any of your Common App schools require a Mid-Year Report, you must submit another request at that time.
- Oschools using an Online Portal, such as Send EDU, CollegeNet, or Applyweb.com (Electronic): Only available for schools who provide the option to send a request through their application portal. Requires you to submit your school counselor's name and email address as a part of the application. For UGA, students must submit their applications BEFORE counselors can complete their recommendations.
- Out of State Colleges, Colleges using paper/hard copy recommendation forms, and Scholarships/Other Agencies (Paper/Hard Copy). The transcript will be prepared for you to pick up within 10 days of request date. Ms. White will email or text you when your transcript and/or recommendation are ready for pick up in the Counseling Office. It is your responsibility to mail the transcript and/or recommendation form to your college or scholarship.

Students are responsible for following up with the college or agency to verify that their transcript/recommendation has been received.

Unofficial Transcripts: Can be printed from Home Access Center or Student Access Center.

#### **CAMPUS VISIT CHECKLIST**



School visits beat pictures in brochures any day! If you have the opportunity, you should experience college life first-hand during your junior and senior years to be sure your home away from home will be the right one for you. Carefully plan each visit ... and limit the number of visits to just schools that are most important to you.

Plan	ning the Visit
	Get a map of the campus. Plan at least a full day (and stay overnight, if possible) at each school. Visit when school is in session. Arrange an interview with an admissions officer or sign up for a group session, if available. Prepare a list of questions you have about the school. Get a notebook to record answers and your impressions.
Wha	nt to Do
	Take a campus tour. Talk with students and faculty. Attend a sporting event, if possible. Check out what's important to you (e.g., dorms, libraries, student unions, athletic facilities).
Wha	at to Look For
