TYPES OF ADMISSION DECISIONS

EARLY ACTION: Allows a student to apply prior to the regular deadline for an early determination of admissibility. It is often a NON-BINDING acceptance, which DOES NOT require the student to attend if accepted.

EARLY DECISION: Allows a student to apply prior to the regular deadline for an early determination of admissibility. It is often a BINDING acceptance, which DOES require the student to attend if accepted.

DEFERRED DECISION: A college/university determines that more information is needed to make a final decision about a candidate's application.

ROLLING ADMISSION: Admission notifications are released as soon as the complete application has been processed.

OPEN ADMISSION: The admission requirements are relaxed. Admission notifications are released as soon as the complete application has been processed.

DEFERRED ADMISSION: Permits a student, once accepted, to postpone matriculation for one year.

CONDITIONAL ADMISSION: Admitted provided that the student continues to meet the requirements of the school or complete additional coursework/supplemental program.

TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS

- Request a transcript through Naviance
- Allow 2 school days for processing

RECOMMENDATION REQUESTS

- FOR COUNSELOR/TEACHER/OTHER LOR: Complete & provide a copy of your SENIOR PROFILE to your recommender. The profile may be accessed via https://tinyurl.com/CHSSeniorProfile
- FOR COUNSELOR/TEACHER/OTHER LOR: Input, where indicated on the application, the recommender's name and e-mail address.
- If the application does not allow for an electronic LOR submission, please provide the recommender a physical copy of the recommendation form. Be sure to provide a student signature where indicated on the form.
- Allow 10 school days for processing



UNLOCKING THE GPA MYSTERY

NUMERIC GRADE AVERAGE (NGA): Fulton County School System reports the NGA to colleges (ex. 87.4412). The final semester grade for every attempted HS course is averaged together on a 100-point scale. NGA includes Honors Points.

4.0 CUMULATIVE GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA): Every semester grade is converted from a numeric scale to a 4.0 scale, and then averaged together. A=4; B=3; C=2; F=0 (ex. 2.254). Fulton County does not convert NGA's to GPA's.

CORE GPA: The grade conversion is the same as the cumulative GPA above; however, the average is only taken from courses within core subject areas: English, Math, Science,

college/post-secondary program. **HOPE GPA:** The calculation process is the same as the CORE GPA above; however, all AP/HONORS/COLLEGE COURSES are stripped of their 7 points before being converted to the 4.0 scale.

Social Studies and World Languages. Whether the 7 points is

included in the CORE GPA calculation is determined by the

- HONORS & COLLEGE COURSES simply convert:
 Ex. 92-7=85 and 85=3.0
- AP GRADES are stripped, converted, then awarded .5:
 Ex. 92-7=85 and 85=3.0 PLUS THE AP .5 =3.5
- HOPE GPA REQUIREMENTS: (HOPE) 3.0; (ZELL MILLER) 3.7
- The HOPE GPA does not include middle school grades









HOPE SCHOLARSHIP RIGOR REQUIREMENTS:

Students must receive credit in **FOUR** of the following types of courses:

- ADVANCED MATH (Adv. Algebra/Algebra II; Trigonometry or higher)
- ADVANCED SCIENCE (Chemistry; Physics or higher)
- ADVANCED PLACEMENT courses in core subjects
- DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES in core subjects that are not remedial or developmental in nature
- ADVANCED FOREIGN LANGUAGE courses

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are a type of financial aid that assists with collegiate expenses; they do not have to be repaid. Scholarships are generally reserved for students with special qualifications such as academic achievement, athletic ability or artistic talent. Awards may also be available for students interested in particular fields of study, who are members of underrepresented groups, or who demonstrate financial need.

WHERE DO YOU FIND SCHOLARSHIPS?

- Contact the colleges of which you are applying and ask about their school-based scholarship opportunities.
- Complete the FAFSA after October 1 of your senior year to apply for federal and state aid programs, including the HOPE scholarship.
