- •Did you "max out" **your** school's curriculum?


### College Essay

- •Essay offers the student a chance to come alive as a human being


•A well-crafted essay can turn an admissions reader into a vocal advocate in committee.

- 5) Could you be more specific?
- 6) Using the hook: dynamic introduction or cut the intro altogether. Start *in medias res*
- 7) Wielding the Samurai sword: the art of editing

- admissions trend: building a "well-rounded class" selecting students expert or deeply versed in 1 area
- **Depth** of experience trumps breadth of experience



Well- rounded student blends in well easier to forget



"**Spikey" student** better "story" more memorable

### **Counselor and Teacher Recs**

61.5% Schools assign Considerable to Moderate Importance to Counselor Recs 60.8% Schools assign Considerable to Moderate Importance to Teacher Recs

- Forge those relationships early: personal connection
- Choose teachers who will have your best interest at heart, want to see you succeed, and write well
- Teachers with whom you have a strong relationshipseveral years can be better



# To interview or not to interview

34.5% Schools assign Considerable to Moderate Importance to Interviews

- Not relevant for majority of students
- Varying degrees of importance: can help some borderline applicants
- Will not make a significant difference for most applicants
- Useful to get information about the school
- Convey enthusiasm and interest
- Must have a good answer for, "Why our school?"

# Applications to the "name" schools have gone nuts: class of 2013

- Harvard: 29,112 applications for 2,046 admits (7.0%)
- Princeton: 21,964 apps for 2150 admits (9.8%)
- Yale: 26,000 apps for 1951 admits at (7.5%)




## Develop a robust list of schools

Things to consider:

- likelihood of admission
- location
- class size
- student body
- Fit is first. Finance is also a factor.

Be sure to have back-ups. The name schools are very competitive!



### College visits are essential

- Enhances motivation: nothing gets students more invested in the process
- Informs the application (why Tufts?)
- Narrows the list
- Chance for an on-campus interview







# How to Apply

- Early decision—a binding agreement due Oct/Nov.
- Early action—a non-binding agreement. The benefits of early decision with none of the binding obligations.
- Early admission—student applies earlier in the year than usual, thus receives his or her results early as well.
- Rolling admission— school keeps accepting applications until all slots are filled.
- **Regular decision** no restrictions
- Wait list—to protect schools from not having enough students enroll. If you are accepted from the wait list, schools have to notify you by August 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### Jed Said: The Ins and Outs of Early Admissions

Latest test dates that will be counted for applications

- Rolling Admissions (most recent scores)
- Early Decision 1 (October, sometimes November)
- Early Decision 2 (December)
- Regular admissions (December and often January)

Some schools will wait on results if you let the office of admissions know new scores are coming.

# Why schools privilege ED apps


- Economic factors: Every student admitted ED saves colleges money
- Selectivity: Managing the U.S. News & World Report rankings
- Managing class size and composition: Tom McManus, (U Penn) ED is a "yield" tool for schools to manage incoming classes
- Resource Management for Admissions Offices

Remember: ED should only be used when there's an **outstanding match** between a school and a student.

#### Student Loans (Best)

- Subsidized Stafford (5.6% and dropping each year till 2012). Need based, deferred interest:
- Unsubsidized Stafford (6.8%). No deferred interest
- Perkins Loan: (5.0 %) Exceptional Need Based Only

#### Parent Loans (Next Best)

Parent Plus (8.25%). Non-need Based, interest accrues upon dispersal.

#### Private Loans (Worst)

"Avoid these if possible, least favorable terms" – Clark Howard



Over the last decade, the tests have become a more significant part of the admissions process.


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In 1993, 46% of Colleges rated test scores as considerably important. Today the figure is 59%

#### Why are these tests so important to admissions?

- Standardized- easy to compare across geographic and demographic lines
- · Efficient way to make big cuts
- Moderately useful predictor of success in college



# SAT Origins (IQ tests)



#### **Carl Brigham**

1920s worked on Army Alpha Tests 1923 wrote <u>A Study of American Intelligence</u> 1926 converted Army Alpha into Standard Aptitude Test, under the auspices of the College Board, administered test to 8,040 high school students 1934 Harvard uses SAT to select scholarship recipients



#### **Henry Chauncey**

1930 Assistant Dean at Harvard 1934 uses SAT to select scholarship recipients 1943 contracts to administer SAT (Army-Navy Qualification Test) to 316,000 high school seniors 1945 Becomes first President of Education Testing Service, ETS

1970 Retires, SAT given to 1.4 million students annually

SAT had its foundations in : **abstract intelligence** and aptitude testing


### ACT Origins (Iowa tests)



**Everett Franklin Lindquist** (1901– 1978) Psychology professor, educational researcher at the University of Iowa 1929 Created tests which became the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills 1959 Created the ACT (American College Testing) in Iowa City, Iowa





# Which test should I try first?

- Both ideally to establish dual baselines
- If PSAT is strong- stick with the SAT
- If PSAT is weak- take an ACT (mock) to compare baselines
- If baselines are similar- go with the SATthe more coachable test
- If SAT prep is not yielding results- switch to the ACT (good to find this out early)
- If you switch, 80% of content transfers





#### Individualized Attention



New technologies have finally made this mode of tutoring a reality

#### Key Components of Effective Prep

- Practice
- Adequate time
- Momentum before tests
- Motivation
- Relationship/Alliance (if you choose the tutoring route)

#### Mock tests: You've got to Practice

#### Mock tests reveal

- Wrong answer patterns (carelessness)
- Time management
- Mental fatigue
- Guessing efficacy

It's not just about the content! The process is 50%.



### Allow enough time to Prep

- This is a process!!!!
   Not a one-shot deal
- Cram jobs almost never work
- Plan on taking the test 3 times. Ideally twice junior year




# Momentum: Going in strong

- Don't spread this out evenly over the year; kids can and do burn out on testing
- Go hard before the actual tests
- Take a mock test within a month of every real SAT
- Give students breaks and time away from prep



# Testing and anxiety



As a tutor, sometimes its my job to generate anxiety in the student, sometime my job is to decrease anxiety.

### Motivation

- The SAT needs to be relevant
- College provides the context- makes it real
- Students have to understand how this serves their values



College visits are fundamental for getting students in the mindset of prepping for the SAT. Having a target school, a concrete goal, is often the only thing that creates the motivation needed to prep for the tests. (Especially for guys.)




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# Writing: does it matter?


- More and more schools are using Writing in their Admissions Process
- Every additional "Objective" measure helps admissions officers make more informed decisions
- Writing is also used to sniff out bogus college admissions essays

#### Ease of Coaching



#### The ideal time to prep

• Junior Year is the absolute best time to start this process. The earlier the better



# Prep for the SAT Subject Tests

- 3,000 + US colleges, roughly 100 use Subject Tests for admissions
- How many to take: 2. Harvard, Georgetown, Princeton: 3
- Timing: May and June are ideal, aligned with APs
- Some schools accept the ACT as a replacement for the SAT+ SAT subject tests: Yale, Brown, Penn, and Duke
- Math 1: easier questions, harder curve.
   Math 2: harder questions, easier curve, ideal post Pre-Cal.
- UC Systems dropped Subject Tests for class of 2012 and beyond.

### Score Reporting

- Score Choice: changes nothing
- Cherry Picking scores: rewards multiple iterations
- No prejudice against multiple sittings

What matters is **that** you get the score, not **how** you get the score

# Prep for the PSAT?

- Only if you are National Merit Bound
- Prep hard for Writing: it's only about the overall index, not the parts
- 2009 NM Index for GA: 215
- NM can translate into serious money-Families can leverage the tiny NM award for merit scholarships worth 10,000K + annually

### **Suggested Timelines**

• Doing the right thing at the right time



### JR Year Timeline

- **Summer:** stay involved in extracurricular activities. Show consistency and depth.
- August: Take a challenging schedule. Add as many APs as you can realistically handle. Jr. year grades must be solid.
- October: PSAT. PSAT prep course if you are a potential National Merit Scholar or want to jumpstart SAT prep.
- November January: Take first SAT or ACT.
   Prepare 8 to 12 weeks prior to scheduled test date.

# JR Year Timeline continued

- January February: Register for spring AP exams.
- December May: Explore financial aid/ scholarships/ grants for college.
- May June: APs, SAT subject tests, ACT, SAT: prep courses as needed.
- June August

Make a college list and collect applications
 Begin applications/essays
 Set up interviews and college visits

# **Senior Year Timeline**

- **Summer:** Stay involved in extracurricular activities.
- August: Strong academic schedule. APs are ideal. Keep grades solid.

#### September-November

□SAT/ACT final push if needed

- Meet with your guidance counselor for application advice
- □ Finish early applications

#### **October:** ED deadlines

# **SR Year Timeline continued**

- November December: Complete remaining applications.
- **December**: ED responses arrive
- March- April: Responses from colleges
- May: Deposits due
- June: Graduate and send final transcript to your school of choice!
